BAND TRIP

I want to commend our music directors and music boosters for a job well done this past week on the band trip. This is the first time I have traveled with the band as the administrator "on board" and I must say it was an educational experience for everyone involved. Our boosters and directors have such a refined process for running this event, there are very few chances for anything to go wrong. This includes on-the-fly itinerary adjustments for snow storms.

Students are accounted for on this trip at virtually every potential separation point. If the group is allowed to stray more than five feet from each other (my estimate, not firm policy) at a location, chaperones collect and account for those in their charge before the group moves to a new location. While on board the ship, chaperones are posted in key locations virtually 24 hours a day to insure students do not veer from the program. All the while, a friendly, accommodating atmosphere is maintained so all may enjoy the trip.

From the earliest preparations students are learning. All students must login and fill out registration information on the cruise lines website to secure their "set sail" pass. This is the card that allows the cruise liner to manage on board purchases and keep track of passengers when they leave the ship at the ports of call. Students experience the process of getting a passport or collecting the multiple documents needed to prove their identity in the absence of a passport.

Students also learn about life in a different culture while on shore in Nassau. They see that life in other countries can be very different from their experience in Bath Township. While on board, our children learn about adjusting to the physical experience of being at sea. They also learn about adhering to different dress codes for different level of events such as the "Captains Dinner." Our students gave an excellent performance in the elaborately ornate "Orpheum Theater" on board the ship. The performance was extremely well attended and received rave reviews along with our children's behavior the entire cruise. From the ship's crew, to the cruise director, to the passengers, everyone went out of their way to let us know how impressed they were with our students.

All of this is just more evidence of what a great community we have here in the Bath Local School District.

LOCAL CONTROL MOVEMENT

Over the past twenty years, the landscape of education in the United States and in Ohio has moved from one of local control, where most decisions and policies are made by the local board of education, to one of state and federal control, where most polices and many detail decisions are made at the state and federal level, then dictated to the local board of education. This shift of control has frustrated many school leaders, myself included, causing us to begin banding together to educate the public about the current landscape of education. After the recent debacle of state testing, I and many other superintendents truly believe that our children would be better off if we began to restore control of our schools to the local board of education.

I plan to join a group of about thirty superintendents to conduct a regional survey and begin crafting articles in an effort to inform you about what is going on in education today so you can decide for yourself if you think a change is needed. I have learned that change is slow until the grassroots majority speaks out to their state senators and representatives. I believe that a more informed public will help me and other school leaders work with our state policy and law makers to craft a better system for educating our children.

For now, I just want to say how honored I am to be a part of the Bath School Community. I thank you for the support you continually give to our school and our children.

I look forward to seeing you at our school and community events. Go Wildcats and Wildkittens!!





FRESHMAN ORIENTATION FOR 2016-2017 SCHOOL YEAR

Parents and students of the current 8th grade class are encouraged to attend the high school freshman orientation meeting that will be held on

February 16 at 7:00 p.m. Bath High School Auditorium

At this meeting, Mr. Gross will review scheduling options for the freshman class for the 2016-2017 school year.

During the afternoon of February 16, Mr. Gross will meet with the 8th grade class to pass out curriculum guides and give information about scheduling and the evening meeting.

Both parents and students are encouraged to attend the evening meeting at the high school and bring the curriculum guide to the meeting.

Here at Bath we run 74 bus routes, drive over 1,000 miles

each day and bus approximately 1,600 students each and every day. Our goal is to provide the safest transportation possible for all students to get to and from school in a timely manner. Some common questions for the Bath Transportation Department are:

Q: I cannot see my child's bus stop from the house. Are there state laws that set the standards for bus stop location?

A: Ohio does not have a law requiring bus stops to be within sight of the student's home. Students in Ohio may be assigned to a bus stop up to one-half mile from their home and we encourage parents to accompany their child to the bus stop whenever possible. This teaches the child safe habits of walking to and from the bus stop and may give the parent piece of mind.

Q: Can I make my child wait inside of my house until the bus is at the stop. I have heard this is not allowed – is this true?

A: Ohio law requires children to be waiting at the bus stop prior to its arrival. Bus drivers count the students at the bus stop 'Place of Safety' as they are approaching the stop before they load and then counts again as they get on the bus to ensure all children are safely on board. If students are not waiting at the bus stop 'Place of Safety,' the bus driver cannot count them and cannot be certain the students are all safely on board. Waiting at the bus stop before the bus arrives further ensures that no one chases after the bus – this is a very dangerous thing to do. We instruct students to be at the bus stop 3-5 minutes prior to the scheduled arrival time of the bus. When there are no students waiting at the bus stop bus drivers are instructed to not stop, so that the event of a student chasing the bus is not possible.

TOYS FOR TOTS CAMPAIGN

In the weeks prior to Christmas break, the Bath Middle School students and staff participated in the Toys for Tots program. This program is coordinated by the Lima Salvation Army. The middle school students and staff did an excellent job collecting toys and supporting a very worthwhile program. We would also like to thank parents and community members who helped support the Toys for Tots program.
