

# Bath School Community Newsletter – Winter 2018

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Dear Bath Community,

I want to continue the conversation started by Mr. Lewellen last spring regarding our school district's next financial challenge because in May of 2018, we will be seeking a renewal of our operating levy which constitutes \$3.7 million of our \$16 million budget. It is important for us to be transparent and have open dialogue with regards to our school finances and the issues we will be facing in the near future. The current Board of Education, Treasurer and previous Superintendents have done a great job keeping us fiscally responsible over the past decade in that we have not had to ask our community for new operating money since 2004. In the spring of 2012 we asked for new money in the form of a bond issue to build a beautiful new elementary school. We are incredibly grateful for this wonderful learning environment in which our kids experience on a daily basis. However, the funds for this construction project to build the elementary are separate from paying utility bills, salaries, etc. Moreover, due to legislative changes in Columbus in the way our district valuation is determined, our community members will inherit more of a burden to maintain our current level of revenue. Let's take a closer look at how three factors may influence your taxes.

First, TPP reimbursement from the state of Ohio. Years ago we passed an emergency levy which is a fixed sum levy that is renewed every five years. A fixed sum levy collects an exact amount of dollars based upon the amount of the levy in the year in which it was passed. As property values go up or down, the county auditor adjusts the millage rate so that the same amount of revenue is generated each year. Furthermore, if there are changes from Columbus in the funding formula for reimbursements, then there can be a change to how the fixed sum levy amount is calculated in relation to who's paying. In 2005, the state legislature stopped taxing our local businesses and industries on their tangible personal property (TPP) (their equipment & inventory). We used to get this TPP reimbursement (tax dollars from equipment & inventory from an industry in our community) from the state. This reimbursement is phasing out over the next five years through year 2021. There will be NO fixed sum TPP reimbursements in 2022. The amount of money the state is cutting its reimbursement will be added on to the local emergency levy and collected in local property taxes. Consequently, they have shifted this burden to real property owners. This begins in tax year 2017 (taxes that will be collected in 2018).

Second, HB 49 requires the Department of Taxation to decrease the Current Agricultural Use Value (CAUV) tax rates beginning with the 2017 reappraisals. Allen County is scheduled for a triennial update in tax year 2018. Per our county auditor, farmers will see a decrease in their valuations (affecting January 2019 tax bills). Bath's Class I valuation is 13% agricultural and 87% residential. For our emergency levy and our bond levy, as CAUV goes down, residential rates will go up. Again, this change in CAUV comes legislatively from Columbus.

Third, we anticipate that residential property values will go up across the state as well as right here in Allen County and Bath Township. This may or may not affect your taxes.

In summary, this is a renewal levy that has been on the ballot since 1979. We are currently on the financial path of an Emergency Operating Renewal and Permanent Improvement Renewal every five years. Permanent Improvement levies generate monies that may only go towards facilities, technology or any items lasting more than five years. Our P.I. renewal will come on the ballot in 2021. The timing of these levies has worked well for the district as there are a couple of years between the two levies. It has given us the opportunity to provide our students with a well-rounded education and provide them with the services they need to succeed.

Over the next few months, we will provide more information regarding the levy on May 8<sup>th</sup>, 2018. If you should have any questions, please do not hesitate to call our office.

## WILDCAT KINDERGARTEN ROUNDUP

Bath Elementary School is taking names for 2018 - 2019 Kindergarten. To be eligible, a child must be 5 years old on or before August 1, 2018. If you have a child who meets this qualification, contact the elementary office during regular working hours. Parents will need to provide the school with the child's birth certificate (which includes mother's maiden name), social security card, immunization information, custody papers (if applicable, including all pages of the document and the judge or magistrate's signature), and three documents providing proof of residency in the Bath Local School District. All of these items must be submitted to the elementary office before registration forms may be completed. Parents should pick-up the initial information packet in the elementary office as soon as possible. Parents will also sign-up for a screening time for their child at that time. Screenings will take place May 29 and May 30. The elementary office is open to pick-up packets from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and from 2:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily.

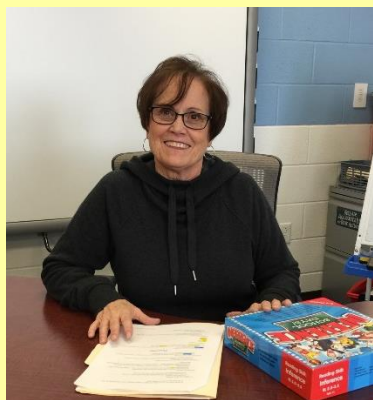

### EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT: JANE BAILEY

We are honored to spotlight Mrs. Jane Bailey in this edition of our Bath School Community Newsletter. Jane grew up in Bath but was a student of St. Rose and LCC who always attended Bath events. She has two daughters, both graduates of Bath Schools, and two grandkids that attended Bath until recently moving to Tennessee. She recalls always wanting to be a teacher as a child. She would often play school growing up. However, she waited until her family was raised to go to college and become a teacher. She chose to wait until she could afford college tuition. While Jane spent most of her years teaching the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade, in her first four years of teaching, she taught four different grade levels, in part due to the closing of Cairo Schools. Now in her 38<sup>th</sup> year of teaching, Mrs. Bailey recounts several changes to her profession: the addition of technology, classroom size, the needs of our students and the new elementary. Jane smiles as she names colleagues that were once students of hers. Currently serving our students as a Title I Teacher, together as a team, the Title I department supports our classroom teachers

in filling the educational gaps of our students, mainly in regards to reading, as well as administering the DIBELS testing. In addition to teaching, Jane also supports our school and community with the Angel Fund Project, Author-Illustrator and Literacy Night. Although Jane admits she loves her job and isn't ready to fully retire yet, she hopes that when she does, she will be remembered as a teacher that taught more than academics; a teacher that taught her students character attributes such as honesty and determination.

### Renewal Levy Highlights:

- This fixed sum levy was passed to bring in \$3.7 million (originally \$2.7 million from real property values and \$1 million from tangible personal property (TPP))
- This levy will never earn more or less for our school district.
- This burden is spread over the entire community's total valuation including residential, agricultural, commercial and industrial properties.
- When the state removed the valuation of industry's tangible personal property (tax on equipment and inventory) from the valuation base, they delayed the impact to real property (houses, structures and land) owners by using CAT (Commercial Activities Tax) income and sales taxes to "reimburse" the school districts for the amount collected on tangible personal property value. This TPP reimbursement is now being phased out and will end in 2022.
- Current Agricultural Use Values are expected to decrease which will cause the residential property owner's rates to increase.
- Residential property values are trending upward.
