

COMMUNITY ROOMS and MERCY HEATH MEDICAL CENTER

When you are on campus through the spring season, I encourage you to pass by the bus garage to see what we have done with the space resources left available after the elementary school moved. Many of you may have already taken advantage of the Bath Community Rooms utilizing the space once inhabited by our elementary library and the immediately adjacent large classroom. We are currently moving activities that were once conducted in the school buildings. This move has alleviated logistical issues with building staff keeping track of who needed space and rearranging cleaning schedules. For the most part, this has been our community's Boy Scout and Girl Scout club meetings. The large community room has also been host to regional superintendent meetings and district level staff meetings. In the past, meetings involving more than 15 participants were held in building spaces where students were moved to make the space available.

In their February regular meeting, the Board approved a rental agreement with Mercy Health Partners to place a medical center in one of the remaining two classrooms. This medical center is open to the public Monday, Thursday, and Friday. We hope this will be a benefit to our staff, parents, and community members for some of the more minor health issues and services that often are best delivered on a convenience basis. If the center sees the need, hours may be expanded in the future.

COMMUNITY SURVEY

You might have seen the news coverage of a newly formed group, the Northwest/West Central Ohio Public School Advocacy Network, of superintendents whose aim is to support and improve public education in our state. To that end, we have launched a survey that can be found at:

If you have not yet taken the time to respond to this survey, please do so before April 25. We will be closing the survey at that time. The survey will take you about five minutes to complete and is designed to help the group understand our community's feelings about our schools and certain public education challenges that exist today. We plan to use this information to guide our advocacy efforts in the future.

WATER TESTS

In light of recent concerns nationally over lead in the water at schools, we had our water tested in the middle school and high school. There was no detectable amount of lead in the water. The elementary was cleared during the occupancy process.

EXTERIOR LIGHTING ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECT

You will notice work being completed this summer replacing our exterior lighting with new, more efficient, LED lights. The Board approved this project in their March regular meeting. A study recently completed shows that this project will pay for itself within seven years. Once work begins, the project should proceed rather quickly and you will notice our lighting around the older buildings looking very similar to the quality of lighting at the new elementary.

I hope you are all enjoying the periodic spring weather and I look forward to seeing you at our school and community events. Go Wildcats and Wildkittens!!


FIFTH GRADE QUIZ BOWL

AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION

Over the past several weeks students have been jumping in a variety of ways! The Elementary Physical Education classes participated in the national program “Jump Rope for Heart”. This is a program sponsored by the American Heart Association that promotes activity and heart/health awareness for kids. The American Heart Association provides funding for research in heart disease and stroke. Students participated by attempting and learning new jump rope moves on short and long jump ropes. In classes, students were also encouraged to consider the value of exercise and how it affects the heart and body in positive ways. Each class discussed creating habits that lead to heart health. The American Heart Association provided us with promotion forms asking for donations or sponsorships during this time as well. In return for helping promote heart health, the Physical Education department receives 12 new jump ropes, resources and curriculum. The program was a terrific success! Many children chose to honor loved ones and attain sponsorship for their jumping during class time.

DR. SEUSS’S BIRTHDAY!!

During the first two weeks in March the Kindergarten classes celebrated Dr. Seuss’s birthday. Dr. Seuss was a pen name used by Theodore Seuss Geisel, a children’s book author and illustrator. During Dr. Seuss week each day consisted of a theme that focused on one or more books by Dr. Seuss. Throughout the weeks, students listened to the stories, completed fun activities that focused on rhyming words, and wrote and illustrated their own stories. This year the highlights were:

*Wacky Wednesday – The students wore crazy, wacky clothes to school. We read Wacky Wednesday and found all the silly things that Dr. Seuss drew in his illustrations.

*Pajama Day – The students wore pajamas to school. We graphed what we like to sleep with and read Dr. Seuss’s Sleep Book.

Students were exposed to a variety of activities including knitting hats, small engine repair, cheerleading, board games, music and many other teacher-led activities. Middle School guidance counselor Jeanna Davis put in a huge amount of time and effort scheduling all the middle school students into their desired activities.



CHANGES FOR THE 2016-2017 SCHOOL YEAR: In an effort to better meet the needs of our students, we will be incorporating some scheduling changes for the 2016-2017 school year. These changes will be in our exploratory classes, with no changes in the core classes of Reading, Math, Science, Social Studies and English.

Grade 6: Students in grade 6 will continue to have an entire year of Keyboarding/Technology as their exploratory class. **Grade 7:** Students in grade 7 will have one semester of Phys. Ed. and one semester of Art. These students can receive high school credit for Art. Therefore, the grade students receive in Art will be reflected on their high school GPA. Parents may elect to have their student take Art without it counting as high school credit by simply contacting the school. **Grade 8:** Students in grade 8 will have one semester of Health and one semester of Phys. Ed. As in the past, all 8th grade students will take Physical Education for high school credit. Like 7th grade Art, Health class in the 8th grade will also be offered for high school credit. Only incoming 8th graders who successfully pass the 7th grade and achieve a passing score on the 7th grade AIR test will be eligible to take Health for high school credit. Any 8th grade student that did not successfully pass 7th grade or the 7th grade Reading AIR test will take 8th grade Health, but not for high school credit. We feel these changes will help to expand our middle school offerings and better prepare our students for their transition to the high school. The Allen County Retired Teachers Association (ACRTA) provides grants to teachers in public schools in Allen County. The grant program is open to any academic discipline, grade level, or building activity that meets the purposes of the school and the needs of the students. Awards of \$200 are given in April. Teachers will use their discretion to conduct the project/program anytime during the academic year as it fits their classroom curricular plan. Sixth-Grade teacher Kendra Bassitt recently applied for and received an ACRTA grant. The money was used to purchase Bouncy Bands for her classroom. The Bouncy Bands purchased through this grant will affect around 140 students on a daily basis. The Bouncy Bands will provide students with a sensory object that is quiet, functional, and consistent. These bands will not only have a positive impact on the education of students who are identified with ADD and ADHD but also the general population of students who are growing, changing, and learning along the way. *Congratulations!* to Ms. Bassitt on receiving the grant!

SCIENCE FAIR

Students in grades 6-8 participated in the middle school science fair on Saturday, February 20. Each participant was evaluated using the following criteria: Knowledge Achieved, Effective Use of the Scientific Method, Originality & Creativity, and Clarity of Expression. All students did an excellent job by going above and beyond the classroom expectations. Those receiving a superior rating were: **Chandler Clark, Payton Meffley, Kristina White, Grace Wood, and Charlie Schneider.** Payton, Kristina, Grace, and Charlie accepted invitations and represented Bath at the District Science Day on Saturday, March 19 at ONU. Charlie and Kristina received superior ratings at Districts and will participate in the State Science Day in Columbus on May 14.
