He drew Spiderman for his nursery school teacher, and he wrote mystery stories for his second grade newspaper. He enjoys putting words and pictures together for kids. Scott has worked as a book designer and an art director. He has been illustrating and writing children's books for nearly ten years. Since several of the books he illustrated are about the Nut family, our theme for his visit will be "We're Nuts About Scott Magoon." In preparation for his visit, all students in grades K-5 will be hearing and reading his books, as well as participating in projects to extend those books. Bath Elementary has annually brought an author/illustrator to visit our school for the last 23 consecutive years, an accomplishment few schools in the nation could match. The creativity of our students and staff has developed this annual tradition into a very educational and enjoyable program. Original funding for this activity was secured by a Martha Holden Jennings grant written by retired art teacher Linda Lehman. Yearly visits have been funded through proceeds from the book sale, coordinated with the author/illustrator's visit, and participation in the Chief's "Community Cash" program, along with donations from the Bath P.T.S.

NO ACT OF KINDNESS, NO MATTER HOW SMALL, IS EVER WASTED - AESOP

What does it mean to be kind? This is what Mrs. Crowe's 1st grade and Mrs. Wiedenbein 4th grade classes have been exploring together this school year. Our exploration started with the books *What Does It Mean To Be Kind?* and *Ordinary Mary's Extraordinary Deed*. We discovered that everyone, no matter how young or old, can show acts of kindness every day in a variety of settings.

The students have spent time together discussing what it means to be kind and simple ways they can show kindness to others at school or at home. Both classes did a random act of kindness like "Ordinary Mary" did in the story by sharing blueberry muffins with another classes.

kindness like "Ordinary Mary" did in the story by sharing blueberry muffins with another class in the building, hoping that the class who received the muffins would be inspired to do an act of kindness for someone else.

During our journey, the two classes met once a month to read, discuss and make projects about random acts of kindness. Each class has shown random acts of kindness for others in the school. As a result, we have noticed a change in how the children treat others, becoming more aware of how their actions can have a positive ripple effect in their own lives and the lives of others. The students have started recognizing small gestures of kindnesses they receive every day.

Our emphasis has been for students to recognize that an act of kindness doesn't require money or material things, but rather, that simple gestures like smiling at someone in the hall, asking someone to play at recess, opening the door for others or writing a simple note. All are acts of kindness we can show every day.

Through this project, the two classes have developed a special bond. One reason for this bond is some of the 4th grade students tutor some of the 1st grade students every morning. We have seen friendships develop between the classes as we continue to read other books, discuss and share thoughts, create artwork and extend acts of kindness.

The students have become more aware, confident, and self-assured with themselves through this process. We hope their experiences this year will have a positive impact, not only on themselves, but on others too.



The Bath High School Interact Club sponsored a Father Daughter Dance on February 11th, 2017 for our elementary students. This was the first dance of its type that our club organized. To say that we were pleased with our turnout is an understatement! We had nearly 500 people attend the dance that night, allowing the Interact Club to donate \$500 to the Field Of Dreams Special Abilities Baseball Field being built on the UNOH campus, and \$100 to Polio Plus. We are very grateful to all that were able to attend. We look

GRADE 8 BOOK CLUB

Mrs. Wicker, eighth grade English teacher, coordinates a book club that meets during lunch on Wednesdays. Mrs. Wicker and the students discuss book choices and then acquire the books either through parent purchase or the library. Students read onefourth of the book each week. On Wednesday's, they bring their lunch to her classroom, where students post discussion questions on the white board and the lunch period is spent discussing the book. The purpose of the book club is both academic and social. Students have the opportunity to read and think about literature in a way that connects it to life. This time also gives Mrs. Wicker an opportunity to interact with students on a personal level. A variety of genres and reading levels are offered in order to encourage students to actively participate. The number of students participating ranges from 15 to 35, but generally, there are around 20 students who read each book. This school year, students have read seven books.

SEVENTH-GRADE BASKETBALL



OLWEUS PROGRAM

The Bath school district continues to use the OLWEUS bullying prevention program. The program's goals are to reduce and prevent bullying problems among school children and to improve peer relations at school. The program has been found to reduce bullying among students, improve the social climate of classrooms, and reduce related antisocial behaviors. The OLWEUS program has been implemented in more than a dozen countries around the world, and in thousands of schools in the United States. New staff members are trained each year at Bath. To stay

proactive, the staff and students have regularly scheduled OLWEUS meetings. Students and parents may also fill out an anonymous bullying report on Bath's website. Students are encouraged to speak to an adult at home and/or school if he/she feels bullied. Bullying is an intentional written, verbal, or physical act that a student has exhibited toward another particular student more than once. This behavior causes mental and/or physical harm to the other student and is sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates a threatening or abusive educational environment for the other student. Please contact a building office if you have any concerns about bullying.



SCIENCE FAIR

Thirty-eight students in grades five through eight competed in the annual science fair at Bath Middle School on Saturday, February 25th.
